

Dear People of Bethania,

As May begins, we continue with two strong ministries: the **Meal Site** on Sunday, May 4, and **Thread-by-Thread** on the first and third Wednesdays, May 7 and 21. It's important to continue to support these efforts which respond to Jesus's parable in Matthew 25 – 'I was hungry and you fed me, naked and you clothed me.' Check out the announcements elsewhere in this newsletter to plan your participation.

We also are embarking on **two new ministries** at Bethania. One is a formalizing of something that's been building in recent years: cooperation between five of our ELCA congregations in Racine: Bethania, Journey in Faith, Living Faith, Redeemer, and United. We've shared midweek Lenten worship. This year we extended it to Holy Week worship. Several of the congregations have been doing Confirmation education together. We are now going to build on those efforts, meeting quarterly to plan joint efforts at ministry, continuing and extending what has been happening. We are talking about, for example, adding elementary age education to the Confirmation programming. We are calling ourselves the **Racine Collective**. We meet this month; stay tuned for more information! The second new ministry is one that we've been exploring and planning for a year or so. At the Annual Meeting in January, we voted overwhelming to embark on it: the **Reconciling in Christ** process of evaluating the quality of Bethania's welcoming spirit, especially to groups who have not always felt welcome at church, such as LGBTQ people.

This past Sunday (April 27) I preached on the importance of undergoing this process for the church's continuing journey to get out from under the influence of the nationalistic thinking that has plagued us for more than a thousand years. When I say "nationalistic thinking," I'm talking about the habit of always seeing our human relationships in terms of good and bad, us and them – the thinking, in short, that keeps humanity mired in violent, deadly divisions. This thinking is so much of a habit that we have lost sight of some basic insights of the Gospel. The Reconciling in Christ process is vital to nothing less than living more faithfully into the Gospel message.

An example I used on Sunday involves how our habit of thinking in nationalistic terms of Us-vs-Them can even unwittingly influence our translation of the Bible. The NRSV translates John 20:23 as, "If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." This incorrect translation leaves the door open to the consequences of our Us-vs-Them habit of thinking. We forgive the many sins common to most of us. And the supposed sins we choose to retain are those of only a certain group of people, who become one of "Them." This is what we've done with LGBTQ people, singling out their supposed 'sins' relating to sexual orientation and gender experience. Instead of listening to their experience of having been created by God on the diverse spectrum of God's good creation, we retain their 'sins,' thus creating one of the Them-groups that *sinfully* maintains our sense of order in terms of Us-vs-Them.

When we translate John 20:23 correctly, within the whole of the New Testament Gospel message, we come to see that the big sin involved with the church's thinking about LGBTQ people has been our sin of Us-vs-Them thinking. A more correct translation of John 20:23 is, "Of whomever you forgive sins, they are forgiven them; whomever you hold fast are held fast." There's no retaining of sins that leaves the door open to our Us-vs-Them games that have had such hurtful and even deadly consequences. There's only holding each other fast in this Gospel community, where God is creating one new humanity in place of all the divisions we sinfully rely on (Eph 2:15). We are baptized into the oneness of a community where the old means of divisiveness no longer divide us (Gal 3:27-28). We are able to follow God's own lead in ceasing to hold ('retain') sins against each other, living into a Ministry of Reconciliation, because God in Christ is reconciling the whole world (2 Cor 5:17-19). Dear friends in Christ, embarking on the Reconciling in Christ process can be

a key to purging the last of our Us-vs-Them nationalistic thinking and to thus more faithfully living into the Ministry of Reconciliation to which we are called.

Please prayerfully consider how you will participate in this vital Reconciling in Christ process. Peace, Pastor Paul

Reconciled to Christ refers to being restored to a state of harmony and friendship with God through Jesus Christ, as described in 2 Corinthians 5:18-21 and other biblical passages. This reconciliation involves the restoration of a broken relationship and the forgiveness of sins, achieved through Christ's sacrifice.

Key aspects of being reconciled to Christ:

• Divine Initiative:

God initiated the reconciliation, sending Christ to atone for humanity's sins.

• Christ's Sacrifice:

Jesus' death and resurrection provided the basis for reconciliation, bridging the gap between humanity and God.

• Forgiveness of Sins:

Through Christ, God forgives the sins of those who believe and are reconciled.

• New Relationship:

Reconciliation establishes a new relationship with God, characterized by peace, forgiveness, and a restored fellowship.

• Ministry of Reconciliation:

Those who are reconciled to Christ are called to share the message of reconciliation with others.

Scriptural References:

• <u>2 Corinthians 5:18-21</u>:

Describes God's reconciliation through Christ and the ministry of reconciliation entrusted to believers.

• Ephesians 2:16:

Mentions the cross as the instrument of reconciliation, bringing together humanity and God.

<u>Colossians 1:20</u>:

States that through Christ, all things in heaven and earth are reconciled to God.

In essence, being reconciled to Christ means being restored to a loving, harmonious relationship with God through the forgiveness and redemption offered by Jesus Christ.
